So far this year we have discussed Don Cupitt's letter Our Dual Agenda and plan to continue at the May meeting.

In March we heard the Rev. Clark (St. Lukes', Remuera) explain his findings for his dissertation Christian Faith and the Generational Difference focussing on the "baby boomers": that one third of NZ's population which was born between 1946 and 1964.

Our April topic is Building Our Own Theologies — a consideration of five manifestos as a basis for preparing our own.

Dunedin Sea of Faith Group

The new year's programme is well under way, following a similar format to last year's: a monthly meal-discussion, with a series of sub groups meeting weekly, fortnightly or monthly.

The March main meeting centred on "Bereavement":

(a) what turns me off, at funerals I attend? — mawkish hymns portraying the departed as a plaster saint; concentrating

Three Aspects of **Fundamentalism**

predominant current form of Christian fundamentalism is American in its main leadership and its immediate origins. It follows a system of Biblical interpretation and associated prophecy belief known as premillenial dispensationalism. finds in the Bible teachings that are often different from a plain ignores modern scholarly insights into the origins of the Biblical documents. By presenting the Bible as different from what it really is, it misrepresents the Bible.

Other streams of Christian fundamentalism, such as the "fundamentalism" which Peter Cameron encountered in the continuing Presbyterian Church of Australia, have by comparison relatively little importance on the worldwide scene. (Peter Cameron's book Fundamentalism and Freedom was discussed in Newsletter 14.)

In Apocalypse: On the Psychology of Fundamentalism in America (Beacon Press 1994), C. B. Strozier argues that "the apocalypse energises contemporary fundamentalism". first part of this book uses interviews with members of fundamentalist churches to provide an insight on the thinking processes of members of fundamentalist churches in the U.S.A. In the second part Strozier presents the apocalyptic in America for American society. comparison - that of the Hopi

Indians, and the less well defined expression found in the New Age movement. The connection between this second part and the rest of the book. seemed to me strained. Finally, Strozier presents his own view of the future of American funda-While Strozier acmentalism. knowledges that Falwell and Robertson are ominous, he finds it a hopeful sign that they have brought fundamentalists into the process of compromise that makes up American politics"

In God's Own Scientists Creationists in a Secular World (Rutgers University Press 1994). Christopher Toomey describes the Institute for Creation Research and other major antievolution organisations, and assesses their influence. Much as J.N.D. Darby's views have provided the framework for the interpretation of scripture and for prophetical ideas, so it is Henry reading of the text. Equally, it M. Morris's flood geology that has prevailed in the interpretation of the Biblical creation and flood stories.

> Toumey set out to understand the motivation for creationist ideas and to discover what sorts of people embrace creationist belief. An attraction of scientific creationism may be that it gives the appearance of providing a scientific authentication for important fundamentalist doctrines

In Under God - Religion and American Politics (Simon and Schuster 1990), Gary Wills explores the huge influence of religion in recent American politics. Wills provides readable and scholarly accounts of the origins and influence of fundamentalist and other American ideologies which have nurtured major political figures - William Jennings Bryan from the 1920s, Gary Hart, Reagan, the Quayles, Jesse Jackson, Andrew Young and Mario Cuomo. Dukakis appears as a secularist who, to his political detriment, did not undertwo alternative expressions of stand the place of religion in

Glossary

Confused by all the shades and varieties of liberal Christian thought? Confused by acronyms? Perhaps the following will help.... It came from the UK Sea of Faith.

Faith in Cyberspace

- Christian or religious humanist. One whose humanism finds expression within some form of Christian or religious tradition.
- Humanist. One who believes that all values are the product of human culture and are not derived from some extra-terrestrial source. Some forms of humanism are expressly anti-religious while others see religious language, ritual, art and practice as creative expressions of the human spirit.
- Non-realist. SoF uses "non-realism" to refer to the belief that God has no "real", objective or empirical existence, independent of human language and culture; God is real in the sense that he is a potent symbol, metaphor or projection, but has no objective existence outside and beyond humanity.
- Post-Christian. One who has passed through and gone beyond Christianity. The Post-Christian may acknowledge roots and values deeply embedded in Christian culture and tradition, but has cut loose or drifted free from Christian dogma, doctrine, and belief-systems, and perhaps from participation in any kind of church life and practice.
- Post-Modernist. The post-modernist believes that there are no objective facts; there is only language and interpretation. If "God" is a useful concept for structuring our experience, that makes him as real as anything else.
- Radical Christian. To some, radical Christian applies to those whose faith finds expression in radical politics, such as liberation theologians. More broadly it can refer to those who want to reform Christian theology literally "from the roots", which may or may not include taking a "non-realist" view of God and religious faith.
- Reverent Agnostic. One who is basically humanist, but believes that there is more to life than bread and ethics, i.e. a spiritual dimension. S/he doesn't believe in the supernatural, but may feel that creation has a purpose and that there is a transcendant force for good at work in the world.
- Spiritualist. The spiritualist may not be sure about God, but has a sense of the holy, the transcendant, and other dimensions, including possibly the magical. New Agers fall into this category.
- Theist. The theist believes that God exists realistically, objectively, independent of human thought; God created and sustains everything, is omnipotent and eternal, but is personal, interested and answers prayer.
- SoF. The Sea of Faith. The title is taken from Don Cupitt's book by that name, which in turn refers to Matthew Arnold's poem "Dover Beach". Not to be confused with.....
- S of F. The Society of Friends, also known as the Quakers.
- SCM. The Student Christian Movement. SCM Press is the chief UK publisher of liberal and radical theology.
- SPCK. The Society for the Promotion of Christian Knowledge.
